A NOTE FROM PATRICIA HART ZACKMAN



"Bokeh", a Japanese word meaning blur, has appeared in photographs since the early days of photography. Not until 1997 was there a word to describe the out of focus highlights produced by a wide open aperture.

The first part of the meeting will be an interactive discussion of bokeh and the second part will be a hands on workshop. Bring your fastest lens (min *f*2.8) and discover natural bokeh. We will also create our own bokeh, using a DIY KIT with shapes to create fun images.

I will bring a light source and props as well as a sample kit.

HOW A WEEKLY CHALLENGE HAS CHANGED ME



For 2020, I decided to participate in the 52Frames weekly photography challenge. Big deal, am I right? Well, as it turns out, it is.

If you're reading this newsletter, you're interested in photography. More so, you're probably interested in <u>improving</u> your photography. Attending MCC meetings and meetups is great. Reading books and participating in workshops is great too. Of course, there are those who say, "Just get out and shoot!" And I can't disagree with any of that advice.

A weekly challenge is another dimension. There's a different theme each week as well as an extra credit theme (related to the primary theme). Other challenges exist, but I like 52Frames. Their website is easy to navigate. You can view and, if you're inclined, offer feedback for the submissions of your fellow 'framers.'

Here's what I've learned after just a couple months: it's a lot harder than I expected. That's not a bad thing, by the way, but I wasn't prepared for the amount of thought I'd put into planning each week's submission. Considering the theme and conceptualizing an image doesn't always come quickly or easily. Next, considering a

prospective subject, setting, lighting, and other elements requires even more thought. This needs to be fit in between time with family, at work, and whatever else is going on that week. For me, this now fills in the crevices of time while driving, showering, and otherwise daydreaming. I find I can't wait until the


weekend to work on my new image each week.

52Frames permits just one submission per week and it must be made during that week. There's no rummaging through old hard drives looking for a submission. This can be good or bad depending on your perspective, but I believe it adds to the challenge of the challenge. Whatever you plan to say must be done inside 2048 pixels and must be made within seven days.

This weekly project is allowing me to grow as a photographer. And that's my goal for this effort. Most images I produce aren't portfolio-worthy, but making them has forced me to stretch the limits of my mind and my camera.


This is a superb exercise to stimulate creativity and enhance skills. If something like this sounds intriguing, I encourage you to consider a challenge of your own. **M**

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Cape May is considered the best-preserved 19th-century seashore resort in the United States. The entire center of Cape May (30 blocks) is a registered National Historic Landmark with over 600 Victorian-era houses. These charming summer cottages were designed with covered porches for enjoying the sea breezes and decorative elements such as "gingerbread" trim, "wedding cake" details, turrets, and gables.

The Emlen Physick Estate is a "Stick Style" Victorian house (and includes a museum and tearoom) that represents a break from the overly fanciful Victorian facades. At the heart of the Historic District, the Washington Street Mall (between Ocean Street and Perry Street) includes three blocks of enticing locally owned boutiques, candy stores, ice-cream shops, and restaurants.

A wonderful way to explore the Historic District is by foot or bike, stopping to admire the gorgeous "painted ladies" (Victorian houses). The Mid-Atlantic Center for the Arts & Humanities offers guided walking tours along Washington Street, where many of the town's prettiest old houses are found. Other especially lovely Victorians grace Lafayette Street, Hughes Street, and Columbia Avenue. The "Stockton Row Cottages" on Gurney Street are also famous.

A few landmark hotels stand on Beach Avenue overlooking the ocean: Congress Hall built in 1816, and the Victorian-era Inn of Cape May. In October, during Victorian Weekend, tourists enjoy special house tours and entertaining activities such as playing Victorian parlor games.







Horizontal images must be no more than 1400 pixels wide or 1050 pixels tall. Vertical images must be no more than 1050 pixels tall. Save the file in jpeg format only.

sRGB color space is recommended for optimum results. File name restrictions are only those that are designated on the entry web page.

In this inter-club competition, both color and monochrome images are acceptable. The subject matter is unrestricted.

Images may be altered by the maker, and artwork or computer graphics created by the entrant may be incorporated if the photographic content predominates. Images may not be constructed entirely within a computer.

Lewis Wickes Hine was an American sociologist and photographer. Hine used his camera as a tool for social reform. His photographs were instrumental in changing child labor laws in the United States.

LIFE MAGAZINE AND THE POWER OF PHOTOGRAPHY

From the Great Depression to the Vietnam War, the vast majority of the photographs printed and consumed in the United States appeared on the pages of illustrated magazines. Offering an in-depth look at the photography featured in Life magazine throughout its weekly run from 1936 to 1972, this exhibition examines how the magazine's use of images fundamentally shaped the modern idea of photography in the United States. The work of photographers such as Margaret Bourke-White, Larry Burrows, Henri Cartier-Bresson, Frank Dandridge, Gordon Parks, and W. Eugene Smith is explored in the context of the creative and editorial structures at Life. Drawing on unprecedented access to Life magazine's picture and paper archives, as well as photographers' archives, the exhibition presents an array of materials, including caption files, contact sheets, and shooting scripts, that shed new light on the collaborative process behind many now-iconic images and photo-essays.



Helpful Tips for Submitting Prints for a Competition

- Prints must be cardboard mounted without glass frame.
- The cardboard mount must be a minimum 80 square inches, e.g., 8×10 inches, and a maximum of 16×20 inches.
- All prints shall be labeled on the back in the upper left with title, maker's name, and level for the respective print category. Labels are available should you need them.
- No writing of any type is allowed on either the image or the mat surrounding an image.
- Images not complying with size requirements or having visible writing on the front will be immediately disqualified from judging.
- All print images must also be submitted digitally.

Please note that if these procedures are not followed, your submission will be disqualified for that competition. Please reach out with questions.
